An analysis of Federation University Australia's contribution to the economic prosperity and long-term future of its communities.

Federation University has been part of regional Victoria for more than 150 years.

Today, Federation is integral to the success of the Ballarat, Gippsland, South-East Melbourne and Western Victorian regions, shaping the economic and social future of the communities it serves.

Its contribution extends well beyond its campuses – training skilled workers, supporting thousands of jobs, creating equitable education and helping build the workforce Victoria and its economy need to grow.

This analysis sets out the University's impact through three key connected channels:

Layer ①

Immediate community benefits from operations, staff employment and student spending

Layer ②

An annual pipeline of graduates for local employers

Layer ③

Long-term value of locally trained graduates who stay in the region and support economic growth
